Join the **Center for Jewish History** and the **Institute for Curriculum Services** for an immersive professional development day designed for Grades 6–12 English and Social Studies teachers.

The program begins with a visit to **Anne Frank The Exhibition**, featuring a historic full-scale recreation of the Secret Annex and context for Anne's life. Following the tour, teachers will consider the broader historical context to Anne's story. Through interactive workshops and ready-to-use resources, they will consider antisemitism's ancient beginnings and its evolution into religious, economic, political, and racialized forms. Then, they will consider how Anne's story relates to the Jewish American story by looking at the context of Jewish Immigration to the United States, particularly the 1924 Immigration Act and its repercussions.

Educators will consider how these topics intersect with each other in the past, in the present, and in their classrooms, bringing the lessons of Anne's story to a new generation of students as they write the next chapter in history.
